Meeting for Worship: Return to The Abbey Centre

From our Clerk, Alan Pearmain:

The Northcourt Centre has been very good to us, and we have been able to hold Meeting for Worship there while the Abbey Centre was closed to all but their vulnerable clients. The Abbey Centre now seems to be known as Abingdon Community Support Service. They are able to have us back and we will meet there every Sunday at 10:15am beginning on 7th August.

The main change from how we used the Centre before is that there is a barrier to the car park opposite that needs a card for access. We will have someone operating the barrier before

Meeting, but ask you to **arrive by 10.10** so that we can centre down for Meeting at 10.15. The barrier rises automatically when you leave the carpark. We also need to let you into the building as the front door is kept locked.

We will meet in the hall as this gives us room to space seats apart and has doors onto the garden area so that we can have good ventilation. We will see if it is possible to have our Meeting for Worship in the garden once a month when the weather is fine.

Unfortunately, when Sally went to collect the key it seems that the area that we use has not been properly cleaned recently. We will have to make representations about this.

We will continue to have a Meeting on the first Thursday of every month at St Ethelwold's at 7:30pm.
